Bedelia Anne O'Brien Zeis, 88, of Florence, passed away peacefully at her home on Monday, April 27, 2026, surrounded by her loving children.

Born on March 27, 1938, in Cincinnati, Bea, as she was best known, was the oldest of thirteen children born to the late John William and Anne Mary Quinn O'Brien. As the eldest sibling, she naturally became a guiding presence and a trusted "go-to" person for family and friends throughout her life. Raised in a large, close-knit family, Bea especially cherished the memories shared with her siblings growing up on the family's farm, which she lovingly referred to as "The Hill." She often recounted stories of the adventures she and her siblings had, including swimming in the pond, her brothers building log cabins, calling "Hootie Hoot Hoot" for the great horned owl, Hootie, whom her brother Jake rescued, and the shocked look of those who came upon their pet lion, Tex.

As a young woman, Bea earned her license in cosmetology, and later, as a wife and mother of three children, she began a career as a respected female trainer of thoroughbred racehorses, where her love of animals, determination, and hardworking spirit shone. After many years of training horses, Bea worked in the field of nursing, caring for patients at Booth Hospital. She then spent several years dedicated to caring for the Little Sisters of the Poor in Fort Thomas, Kentucky. No matter what her endeavor was at the time, she was passionate and devoted to being the best she could be.

Bea was fiercely loyal when it came to those she loved. Being the eldest of 13, she developed a strong sense of responsibility for those she cared for,

quick to come to aid in times of need. Bea had a genuine interest in people, never met a stranger and could strike up a conversation with anyone. She had a special way of making others feel seen, valued, and welcome.

Faith was the foundation of Bea's life. She was passionate about God's Word and eagerly shared it with those she encountered. She loved Jesus deeply, and her strong faith in Him was a constant source of strength in her life.

Bea leaves behind a loving family who will continue her legacy of kindness and compassion: her son, John Zeis of Florence, her daughter, Theresa "Tessie" Kelly (Ernie) of Carmel; four beloved grandchildren, John Kelly, Tyler Zeis, Kennedy Zeis, and Anna Kelly, who were blessed to call her "Grandma"; one great-granddaughter, Rosalie; six siblings, John O'Brien, Terry O'Brien, Anne Beck, Sheila Stacey, Matthew O'Brien, and Tessie Suetholz; along with many extended family members and dear friends.

In addition to her parents, Bea was preceded in death by her beloved son, Kevin Joseph Zeis, on April 1, 2020, Arthur J. Zeis, on August 10, 2020, and six siblings: Denny O'Brien, Patrick O'Brien, Kevin O'Brien, Mary O'Brien, Jake O'Brien, and Ellen Whitman.
